The Easter Alleluia

Our thoughts in this present life should turn on the praise of God, because it is in praising God that we shall rejoice for ever in the life to come; and no one can be ready for the next life unless he trains himself for it now. So we praise God during our earthly life, and at the same time we make our petitions to him. Our praise is expressed with joy, our petitions with yearning. We have been promised something we do not yet possess, and because the promise was made by one who keeps his word, we trust him and are glad; but insofar as possession is delayed, we can only long and yearn for it. It is good for us to persevere in longing until we receive what was promised, and yearning is over; then praise alone will remain.

Because there are these two periods of time — the one that now is, beset with the trials and troubles of this life, and the other yet to come, a life of everlasting serenity and joy — we are given two liturgical seasons, one before Easter and the other after. The season before Easter signifies the troubles in which we live here and now, while the time after Easter which we are celebrating at present signifies the happiness that will be ours in the future. What we commemorate before Easter is what we experience in this life; what we celebrate after Easter points to something we do not yet possess. This is why we keep the first season with fasting and prayer; but now the fast is over and we devote the present season to praise. Such is the meaning of the *Alleluia* we sing.

Both these periods are represented and demonstrated for us in Christ our head. The Lord's passion depicts for us our present life of trial—shows how we must suffer and be afflicted and finally die. The Lord's resurrection and glorification show us the life that will be given to us in the future.

Now therefore, brethren, we urge you to praise God. That is what we are all telling each other when we say Alleluia. You say to your neighbor, "Praise the Lord!" and he says the same to you. We are all urging one another to praise the Lord, and all thereby doing what each of us urges the other to do. But see that your praise comes from your whole being; in other words, see that you praise God not with your lips and voices alone, but with your minds, your lives and all your actions.


We are praising God now, assembled as we are here in church; but when we go on our various ways again, it seems as if we cease to praise God. But provided we do not cease to live a good life, we shall always be praising God. You cease to praise God only when you swerve from justice and from what is pleasing to God. If you never turn aside from the good life, your tongue may be silent but your actions will cry aloud, and God will perceive your intentions; for as our ears hear each other's voices, so do God's ears hear our thoughts.

Did you know that we have Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament every day at St. James Chapel from after the morning 7:45 am Mass 'til 8 pm most evenings. On the First Friday of the month there is always adoration through the night to Saturday morning Mass.



Ten Biblical Reasons For Wanting To Spend One Hour With Jesus In The Blessed Sacrament

- 1. He is really there! "I myself am the living bread come down from heaven." (John 6:35)
- 2. Day and night Jesus dwells in the Blessed Sacrament because of his Infinite love for you! "Behold I will be with you always even to the end of the world," because "I have loved you with an everlasting love, and constant is my affection for you." (Matthew 28:20; Jeremiah 31:3)
- 3. The specific way that Jesus asks you to love him in return is to spend one quiet hour with him in the Blessed Sacrament. "Where your treasure is, there is your heart...." "Could you not watch one hour with me?" (Matthew 6:21; 26:40)
- 4. When you look upon the Sacred Host, you look upon Jesus, the Son of God. "Indeed, this is the will of my Father, that everyone who looks upon the Son and believes in him shall have eternal life. Him I will raise up on the last day." (John 6:40)
- 5. Each moment that you spend in His Eucharistic Presence will increase his divine life within you and deepen your personal relationship and friendship with him. "I have come that you may have life, and have it more abundantly." "I am the vine and you are the branches. Whoever remains in me and I in him shall bear much fruit because without me, you can do nothing." (John 15:5)
- 6. Each hour you spend with Jesus will deepen his divine peace in your heart. "Come to me all of you who are weary and find life burdensome and I will refresh you..." "Cast all of you anxieties upon the one who cares for you..." "My Peace is My Gift to you." (Matthew 11:28; Peter 5:7; John 14:17)
- 7. Jesus will give you all the graces you need to be happy! "The Lamb on the throne will shepherd them. He will lead them to the springs of life-giving water." (Revelation 7:17)
- 8. Jesus is infinitely deserving of our unceasing thanksgiving and adoration for all he has done for our salvation.
- "Worthy is the Lamb that was slain to receive honor, glory and praise." (Revelation 5:12)
- 9. For peace in our country! "When my people humble themselves and seek my presence... I will revive their land." (2 Chronicles 7:14)
- 10. Each hour you spend with Jesus on earth will leave your soul everlastingly more beautiful and glorious in heaven! "They who humble themselves shall be exalted...." "All of us, gazing on the Lord's glory with unveiled faces, are being transformed from



glory to glory into his very image." (Luke 18:14; 2 Corinthians 3:18)



THE ASCENSION IN THE CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH

ARTICLE 6: "HE ASCENDED INTO HEAVEN AND IS SEATED AT THE RIGHT HAND OF THE FATHER"

659 "So then the Lord Jesus, after he had spoken to them, was taken up into heaven, and sat down at the right hand of God." Christ's body was glorified at the moment of his Resurrection, as proved by the new and supernatural properties it subsequently and permanently enjoys. But during the forty days when he eats and drinks familiarly with his disciples and teaches them about the kingdom, his glory remains veiled under the appearance of ordinary humanity. Sat Jesus' final apparition ends with the irreversible entry of his humanity into divine glory, symbolized by the cloud and by heaven, where he is seated from that time forward at God's right hand. Only in a wholly exceptional and unique way would Jesus show himself to Paul "as to one untimely born", in a last apparition that established him as an apostle.

660 The veiled character of the glory of the Risen One during this time is intimated in his mysterious words to Mary Magdalene: "I have not yet

ascended to the Father; but go to my brethren and say to them, I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." This indicates a difference in manifestation between the glory of the risen Christ and that of the Christ exalted to the Father's right hand, a transition marked by the historical and transcendent event of the Ascension.

661 This final stage stays closely linked to the first, that is, to his descent from heaven in the Incarnation. Only the one who "came from the Father" can return to the Father: Christ Jesus. ⁵³⁸ "No one has ascended into heaven but he who descended from heaven, the Son of man." ⁵³⁹ Left to its own natural powers humanity does not have access to the "Father's house", to God's life and happiness. ⁵⁴⁰ Only Christ can open to man such access that we, his members, might have confidence that we too shall go where he, our Head and our Source, has preceded us. ⁵⁴¹

662 "And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all men to myself." The lifting up of Jesus on the cross signifies and announces his lifting up by his Ascension into heaven, and indeed begins it. Jesus Christ, the one priest of the new and eternal Covenant, "entered, not into a sanctuary made by human hands... but into heaven itself, now to appear in the presence of God on our behalf." There Christ permanently exercises his priesthood, for he "always lives to make intercession" for "those who draw near to God through him". 544 As "high priest of the good things to come" he is the center and the principal actor of the liturgy that honors the Father in heaven. 545

663 Henceforth Christ is seated at the right hand of the Father: "By 'the Father's right hand' we understand the glory and honor of divinity, where he who exists as Son of God before all ages, indeed as God, of one being with the Father, is seated bodily after he became incarnate and his flesh was glorified." 546

664 Being seated at the Father's right hand signifies the inauguration of the Messiah's kingdom, the fulfillment of the prophet Daniel's vision concerning the Son of man: "To him was given dominion and glory and kingdom, that all peoples, nations, and languages should serve him; his dominion is an everlasting dominion, which shall not pass away, and his kingdom one that shall not be destroyed." After this event the apostles became witnesses of the "kingdom [that] will have no end". 548

IN BRIEF

665 Christ's Ascension marks the definitive entrance of Jesus' humanity into God's heavenly domain, whence he will come again (cf. Acts 1:11); this humanity in the meantime hides him from the eyes of men (cf. Col 3:3).

666 Jesus Christ, the head of the Church, precedes us into the Father's glorious kingdom so that we, the members of his Body, may live in the hope of one day being with him for ever.

667 Jesus Christ, having entered the sanctuary of heaven once and for all, intercedes constantly for us as the mediator who assures us of the permanent outpouring of the Holy Spirit.

WHY AN AUTOMATIC DEBIT PLAN?

Automatic Debit allows St. Mary's parishioners to make their regular Sunday offering using "Direct Debit" system. Automatic Debit is an option, not a requirement! It is being used throughout the Archdiocese of Kingston. We would like to make it available to those St. Mary's parishioners who would like to take advantage of it.


When you participate in the automatic debit system, your regular Sunday offerings are only withdrawn from your account once a month, on or about the 30th day of each month and deposited into the parish account. It does not include any special collections includina cathedral restorations/ preservations. You will be able to contribute to all special collections, cathedral restorations

/preservations using your envelopes.

WILL I STILL USE ENVELOPES?

Envelopes will continue to be issued to all parishioners who request them. Those who choose to use the automatic debit system can simply write PAD (pre-authorized debit) on their regular offertory envelope and drop them into the collection basket. You can also use your envelopes for the special collections not covered by your automatic debit offering.





BENEFITS FOR YOU & FOR ST. MARY'S CATHEDRAL

Automatic Debit is convenient. Your offering is deducted automatically. You will no longer need to search for your cheque book, buy cheques to use for your Church offerings, or stop and withdraw cash from the bank on the way to Mass.

Automatic debit allows you to support St. Mary's when you are away — a benefit for the church since expenses continue all vear long. Most importantly, it's safe and secure. You are protected by very strict banking rules that guarantee your money and account is safe. It's flexible; you can increase. decrease or withdraw from the program at any time simply by dropping a signed note into the collection basket or Parish office 30 days prior to the next withdrawal.

HOW DO I ENROLL IN AUTOMATIC DEBIT?

Decide the amount of your monthly offertory contribution to be withdrawn from your bank account every month.

Fill out the Automatic Debit Authorization include in the adjacent column. Also, include a blank cheque marked "VOID" and place both in a sealed envelope.

Place the envelope in the collection basket or drop it by the parish office or mail it in. Strict confidentiality is always observed in all parishioner financial transactions.

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
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


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
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
