Pope St. Paul VI
Canonized October 14, 2018

Paul VI was born Giovanni Battista Montini in 1897. He died at the papal residence of Castel Gandolfo on August 6th 1978, after being pope for 15 years. At a General Audience on March 16th 1966, he explained that "holiness is within everyone's reach" and that we only need two elements in order to become saints: "the grace of God and good will".

From Archbishop O'Brien

The Holy Father is inviting all the faithful, of all the world, to pray the Holy Rosary every day during the month of October, and thus join in communion and in penitence, as the people of God, in asking Mary, the Holy Mother of God, and St. Michael Archangel to protect the Church from the devil, who always seeks to separate us from God and from one another.

With this request for intercession, the Holy Father asks the faithful of all the world to pray that the Holy Mother of God place the Church beneath her protective mantle: to preserve her from the attacks of the devil, the great accuser, and, at the same time, to make her more aware of the faults, the errors, and the abuses committed in the present and in the past, and committed to combatting without any hesitation, so that evil may not prevail.

The invocation *Sub tuum praesidium* is recited as follows:

We fly to Thy protection, O Holy Mother of God. Do not despise our petitions in our necessities, but deliver us always from all dangers, O Glorious and Blessed Virgin.

The Holy Father has also asked that the recitation of the Holy Rosary during the month of October conclude with the prayer written by Leo XIII:

Saint Michael the Archangel, defend us in battle, be our protection against the wickedness and snares of the devil; may God rebuke him, we humbly pray; and do thou, O Prince of the heavenly host, by the power of God, cast into hell Satan and all the evil spirits who prowl through the world seeking the ruin of souls. Amen.

If the Prayer to St. Michael Archangel is prayed in conjunction with the celebration of Mass, it should be said after the final blessing, since it is a devotional prayer and not part of the Mass.

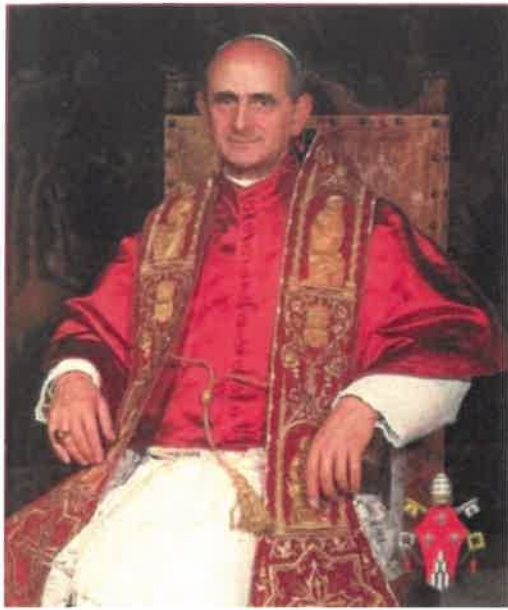

POPE ST. PAUL VI

The second miracle attributed to Pope Paul VI concerned the healing of an unborn in the fifth month of pregnancy. According to the Catholic News Agency the mother, from Verona in Italy, had an illness that risked her own life and the life of her unborn and was advised to have an abortion.

A few days after the beatification of Paul VI by Pope Francis in October 2014, the mother prayed to the now Blessed Paul VI at a shrine in Lombardy and the baby girl was later born in good health.

The first miracle involving Pope Paul VI took place in California in the 1990s. It also concerned an unborn which was found to have a serious health problem that could mean brain damage. Doctors advised that it be aborted, but the mother entrusted her pregnancy to Paul VI. The child was born healthy.

On the basis of that miracle Pope Francis beatified Blessed Paul VI in October 2014, at the conclusion of the extraordinary Synod of Bishops on the Family.

The years of St. Paul VI's pontificate were turbulent ones; when he was elected to succeed the beloved "Good Pope John"—Pope John XXIII—many believed that the cardinal electors had chosen the best qualified man to assume and carry

forward the work of the Second Vatican Council which John had started. Little did Pope Paul or anyone else realize what lay in store for him personally and for the church generally in the years ahead. It was said that Pope John himself had favored Cardinal Montini from Milan as his successor; he knew of him and his abilities, his diplomatic tact, his education, his cultural and religious sensibilities. Even though he referred to him as a "Hamlet"—the Hamlet from Shakespeare—who could seem indecisive and overly cautious, John knew that the Giovanni Montini who became Pope Paul VI basically had the same forward-looking outlook with a strong faith in God and his church.

But the years of assassinations, political upheaval and religious dissension tested Paul mightily. True, he held the church together and brought the Council to a successful conclusion, despite grumblings from some quarters. Also, he had the unfortunate and unenviable task of succeeding a beloved pope in the figure of Angelo Roncalli—no matter what he did or said, he would not come out favorably in the comparison. These were the crosses he had to bear and those, too, he accepted out of obedience and faith.

To a querulous world, he tried to present Catholicism—and Christianity—as a model for living and as a program to give human life meaning and value. And as so often happens when one goes against the grain and offers an alternative to the "ways of the world," the prophet who was Pope Paul was denied, rebuffed, held in contempt, or just ignored. That, too, hurt him, for he was a sensitive soul and he could not help feeling the pain of rejection that is all too often a part of the human experience, which we all share. And yet, he accepted it all because he was devoted to his vocation that he offered to his Lord, way back to his days in Concescio, (in the Lombardy region of Italy) where he felt the stirrings of faith among his family, friends and neighbors.

Paul VI served for fifteen years by the time he died on Transfiguration Day, August 6, 1978. His labours wore him out; though his countenance seemed sad at times, it was understandable, for he was human. He wanted to do good, for he was a good man and wanted others to be and do likewise. But he had an inner joy because of his faith in Jesus and keeping his gaze on Him, he persevered in that faith. He was mindful of what was said in the Book of Sirach; he performed his tasks with humility and realized that though he assumed a position of great power, he had equally great responsibilities, ones which worried him endlessly. He did his best to accomplish the tasks that were laid before him, for he knew that "in fire, gold is tested," and that he had to endure "the furnace of humiliation."

It is curious to reflect on how the will of God works in human affairs. It was just 33 years before, on another August day, when the world was transfigured in another way, when the atomic bomb was dropped on Hiroshima, Japan, ushering in an unwelcome chapter in the annals of death and destruction. But it was on those twinned anniversaries—one when death reigned as a result of war, and the other, when the Lord of all became "dazzlingly white" before mankind—that a frail, elderly pope died, after repeatedly praying the words of the Nicene Creed.

For 80 years, the pope who was born Giovanni Battista Montini, simply trusted in God and placed his hope in Him and because of that, he hoped "for good things," like "lasting joy and mercy." After all these years, his work is now rewarded, and he is now "Blessed." One day, it will ultimately result in the recognition of sainthood. Self-effacing as he was, Pope Paul would not have wanted glory as such; it was enough for him to know, in life—however dimly—the joy and mercy that his Lord offered him. Because of his lifetime of faith and devotion, it was through death that he gained eternal life's gifts of that joy and mercy, a transfiguration he devoutly desired and one which we on earth sorely need.

SPECIAL MASS

THE FEAST OF ALL SOULS, FRIDAY, NOV. 2ND, AT 7 PM

FULL CHOIR; BEAUTIFUL SOLEMN CHANTED MASS

All Souls Day is a solemn celebration in the Roman Catholic Church commemorating all of those who have died and are now in Purgatory, being cleansed of their venial sins and the temporal punishments for the mortal sins that they had confessed, and being made pure before entering into the presence of God in Heaven.

On All Souls Day and at Christmas each priest is permitted to celebrate up to three Masses and the faithful are permitted to attend and receive Holy Communion at all three. The norm is to celebrate only one Mass per day, or attend one Mass per day and receive Holy Communion once per day. However, on special occasions like funerals or weddings, at the bedside of a sick loved one, one can receive a second time. (See directions below)

Here at St. Mary's we will have our usual Masses at 7:45 am, 12:10 pm and a beautiful chanted liturgy at 7 pm in the evening. You are permitted to receive Holy Communion at all three

Detailed guidance from the *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* and other authoritative books for the ceremonies regarding the feast of All Souls.

DIRECTIONS

394. On the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed the Church gathers in solemn suffrage for the souls in purgatory, and the liturgy should express this clearly. The colour of the day is black or violet.¹ If the commemoration falls on a Sunday, it is celebrated on that day and the propers for All Souls replace the Sunday texts.

395. A sense of sobriety and restraint should characterize All Souls Day. Flowers are not placed on or near the main altar, and the organ or other instruments are only used to sustain singing.²

396. On this day every priest may celebrate three Requiem Masses: (1) for a specific intention, (2) for all the faithful departed and (3) for the Holy Father's intentions. This privilege was granted by Pope Benedict XV in *Incruentum altaris* (1915) and has never been revoked.

The celebrant may choose from the three Masses provided in the Roman Missal. According to the options available in the wide range of readings provided in the lectionary, the homily may well develop: our paschal hope of eternal life; the reality and meaning of purgatory; the propitiatory and impetratory nature of the Eucharistic Sacrifice; and the need to pray for the dead as an act of faith, hope and charity within the Body of Christ.³ The celebrant should also announce the indulgences granted on this day.⁴

The breviary recommends the public celebration of Lauds and/or Vespers on All Souls Day.⁵ As much as possible of the hour should be sung, preferably led by cantor(s) and choir. It may be found more convenient to join the celebration of Lauds or Vespers to a Mass, either combining it with the rite of Mass or adding it to the Mass.⁶

The Visit to the Cemetery

399. In some places, it is customary to visit the cemetery to bless the graves of the faithful, even to celebrate Mass there, if this can be carried out with proper dignity and under suitable conditions. The Requiem Mass, Lauds, Vespers or a para-liturgy is followed by the sprinkling and incensing of burial sites.

Through prayer, this indulgence may be given over to the Holy Souls. *Enchiridion of Indulgences*, revised edition, 1986, concession 67. 5.
