A Wonderful Meditation on the Immaculate Conception of Our Lady

Taken from *Divine Intimacy* by Father Gabriel of St. Mary Magdalen, O.C.D. pp. 267-8. The reflection is for the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary which we celebrated on Wed., Nov. 21

From her very earliest years Mary gave herself wholly to God and dedicated herself entirely to his service. Having been conceived in grace and hence exempt from any shadow of sin, Mary was completely open to God, available to his will, and free to give herself to him with the impetus of a love that knew nothing of the delays, the obstacles, or the alternatives that spring from a nature wounded by sin. Her immaculate purity, resplendent with grace, made her capable of adhering to all the good that God proposed to her, to all that was pleasing to him. Thus Mary made a gift of herself that was so absolutely complete that it excels that of any other created being and is surpassed only by that of Jesus the Christ, our God become Man.

From the beginning of her existence Mary was "the handmaid of the Lord" (Luke 1:38) and loved and served him with all her strength. Her answer to the Angel of the Annunciation expressed the attitude in which she has already long lived; this is why, even before she answered, the Angel was able to say: "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favour with God." (Luke 1:30). The Blessed Virgin had always responded with full freedom and with all the love of her immaculate heart to God's initiative in making her be conceived immaculate and therefore full of grace. Because of this, she, who was already full of grace, found new grace in the sight of the Most High who made her the mother of his divine Son.

Mary's greatness is sublime, but it is lived with such simplicity that it neither dismays us nor overwhelms us, but rather attracts and invites us to follow in her footsteps. By means of the grace we have received in baptism, which supports us in our struggle against sin, we are called as Christians to achieve a spotless purity and a full freedom that are like those of Mary so that, together with her and with her help, we may give a generous response to God's gift. If we cooperate fully with the grace we have received, we shall be given fresh graces, and these in turn will make us capable of a yet higher response.

A Spiritual Program Proposal for Advent

"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. ... The Lord is near." St. Paul's letter to the Philippians 4:4-5.

Several years ago I found much of what appears below in an article written by Father Thomas Rosica of Salt and Light Productions. I have altered it here and there but the bulk of it remains Father Tom's.

One of the great stars of the Advent season is John the Baptist. The gospels of Mark and Matthew attest to the large numbers who heard him and went out to see him. The Baptist was a man of the desert and began his preaching there.

Throughout biblical history, leaders and visionaries have gone to the desert to see more clearly, to listen intently for God's voice, to discover new ways to live. The "desert" or "wilderness" is that holy place where God's word is unbound and completely free to be heard. Advent offers us a chance to return to our deserts and discover the word that God has spoken to us.

Luke makes vivid in his gospel the meaning of repentance and forgiveness which John the Baptist preached. It was not to consist simply in sentiments of sorrow and remorse, but rather repentance translated into concrete actions.

There was a great sense of expectancy among the people of John's time for a Messiah. The crowds asked him, "What then shall we do?" to prepare for the coming of the Messiah. The Baptist told those with two coats to share one with those who had none. Likewise, those with an abundance of food were to share with the hungry. Tax collectors were told to collect no more than was appointed to them. Soldiers were to rob no one and be content with their wages. People in general were told to be generous, just, honest, grateful and compassionate.

While in prison, John began to hear about the deeds and message of Jesus. John sent his own disciples to Jesus to ask him: "Are you he who is to come, or shall we look for another?" (Matthew 11:3)

Jesus, according to Matthew, sent back the message: "Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind receive their sight and the lame walk, lepers are cleansed and the deaf hear, and the dead are raised up, and the poor have good news preached to them. And blessed are those who take no offence to me." (Matthew 11:4-5)

John probably expected a fiery social reformer certainly not someone who would associate with the poor, the lame, the blind, outcasts and sinners. Yet Jesus invited John to look around and see the works that had already been accomplished. At times, our Messiah is just so ordinary that we overlook his presence, his message and his works.

What then shall we do to prepare for His birthday this year? Let me suggest a plan of action for these final weeks of 2012: Carve out a little piece of desert in the midst of the busyness of your life. Maybe say "No, thank you," to one or two of the many invitations we receive this time of year. Take a little time for reflection. Go to that desert place and listen to God's voice. Take some time to prayerfully reflect on the depth of God's love for you personally in His coming to us in Jesus Christ.

When you have taken a little time in "the desert" in prayer, then put skin on God and a) Mend a quarrel. b) Build peace. c) Seek out a forgotten friend. d) Dismiss suspicion and replace it with trust. e) Send a Christmas card to someone with whom you are not reconciled. It is so easy to do that this time of year. A simple card saying that you were thinking of them at this time of year. It could go a long way to mending those broken relationships. f) Share some treasure. g) Give a kind answer even though you would like to respond harshly. h) Take time for those around you. Ultimately we have such a short

time here. Make it count. In this day and age our time seems to be our most precious commodity. Don't hoard it to yourself. Find the time. Make time. Take time with others.

Focus on people not on things. I've yet to see a U-Haul at any funeral. I've never met a seriously ill person who wished they had spent more time at the office!

- i) Manifest your loyalty in word and deed. ii) Keep a promise. iii) Forgo a grudge. iv) Forgive an enemy. v) Listen more. vi) Apologize if you were wrong. vii) Be kind even if you weren't wrong! viii) Try to understand. ix) Scoff at envy. x) Examine the demands you make on others. xi) Think first of someone else. xii) Appreciate. xiii) Be kind and gentle. xiv) Laugh a little. Laugh a little more. xv) Deserve confidence. x) Take up arms against malice. y) Decry complacency.
- xvi) Express gratitude. xviii) Go to church. Stay in church a little while longer than usual. Drop by for a visit through the week. The doors are open throughout the day. xix) Welcome a stranger. xx) Gladden the heart of a child. xxi) Take pleasure in the beauty and wonder of the earth.
- xxii) Speak your love. Speak it still once again. Speak it even more loudly. Speak it quietly. And in the midst of everything, rejoice! The Lord is near!

By being more like Him, by allowing Him to change us, the Kingdom comes close to us, and very close to all those we encounter.

Have a wonderful Advent of preparation for the glorious celebration of Christmas. Use the above as a prayerful examination. Reread it over and over, maybe each Sunday in Advent and work on its suggestions throughout the week. Incorporating the above into your everyday life is what it truly means to be ready for Christmas.

What exactly is Cursillo?

St. John Paul II said Cursillo is "an instrument raised up by God for the proclamation of the gospel of our time".

"Here is your role in the Church: to create clusters of believers who will carry the message of salvation everywhere, showing the seriousness of your opinion not by imposing it, but by a strong testimony". (Pope John Paul II)

Cursillo is a movement within the Roman Catholic Church

Its name comes from the Spanish word "Cursillo" which means small course. Its original full name is "Cursillo de Cristiandad" (short course in Christianity). However, it is not a theoretical course nor a traditional retreat; it is best described as an experience. An experience that leads to discover and better live what is fundamental in Christianity

During the Cursillo's 3-days, participants share a profound experience of Christian life ...

The week-end starts on a Thursday night and ends on Sunday night. During these three days, we learn:

- to get to know us (encounter of self),
- to experience the presence and love of Jesus Christ (encounter with God),
- to see the good that can provide a loving and caring Christian community (encounter with others).

—... To help to influence their environment by the force of their testimony

The Cursillo Movement (CM) is an apostolic movement. Its goal is to share with the community the essence of Christianity and Christian values and in this way gradually transform the community from within. To convey its objective, the CM uses the expression "leavening society with the gospel" and it is counting primarily on the testimony of friendship and the deepening of the personal conversion of its members.


