

### THE MISUSE OF THE GIFT OF OUR SPEECH

(from the homily two Sundays ago)

I'd like to propose one small suggestion this week as an aid in helping us to live the love we are to have for one another.

One of our biggest challenges in the spiritual life is the use of our speech. This is often where we fail to love. What we say about others or to others is often where we sin the most.

A good guideline to evaluate what we have said or better to evaluate what I might say prior to speaking, is to ask myself:

Is what I am about to say **True**?

Is it **necessary** to say it?

Is it **charitable**, loving?

TNC, True, necessary, charitable?

Is it true, is it necessary, is it charitable...loving?

We should never say anything that is not true. If one of the other two is lacking we shouldn't speak it. If it is not true we shouldn't say it. If it is not necessary to speak it we should not speak it, if it is not loving...we should not speak it.

We should only speak what is true, necessary and charitable/loving.

BEWARE: PHISHING SCAM: Across Canada, and here in the archdiocese, parishioners have been contacted with a false text message, allegedly from their parish priest, reading something like: "Can I talk to you? ... Someone needs help. I'm at the hospital and I need you to buy me five [iTunes] gift cards, scratch off the codes and send them to me." Never respond to such texts and please contact the parish office should such an event occur. In the past I have had someone use my name falsely for such a scam and parishioners, out of the goodness of their heart, have responded and been scammed out of their hard-earned money. Always contact the office if you think something peculiar is being asked of you.

# Are You or Someone You Know thinking of becoming a Catholic or interested in learning more about the Catholic Faith?

Consider joining The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA). RCIA is an Initiation Process into the Catholic Faith for Adults who a) have never been baptized, or b) are Christians baptized in another Faith Tradition seeking now to be received into full communion with the Catholic Church, or c) for Catholics who are baptised, but who have not received either their first Holy Communion and/or the Sacrament of Confirmation and who now wish to complete their Christian initiation.

RCIA is a process of formation and education into the life, worship and mission of disciples of Jesus Christ in the Catholic Church. We gather on Tuesdays from 7 to 9 pm beginning in September, continuing and including the great celebration of the Great Easter Vigil and the initiation and reception of candidates into the Catholic Faith, and concludes a few weeks later after a period of postbaptismal catechesis. Father Shawn and Deacon Blaine will head up the Formation Team this year. All those planning on taking the course must meet initially with either Father Shawn, fathershawnjhughes@gmail.com or Deacon Blaine at bbarclay31@me.com. Please contact one of us for an appointment.

# My Dear Friends in Christ

You will notice on the next two pages our 2018 Financial Statement. Your Finance Committee has been busy in so many different ways doing the work at keeping our finances in order. I would like to begin this note with a sincere thank you to the members of that committee: Suzanne-Brown Stevenson, Mark Levac (chair), Dan Kasaboski and Allan Scott. Thank you for all your generous hard work.

There has been much discussion, and many meetings, with the Archdiocese regarding the exterior repairs that are badly needed for the cathedral, St. James Chapel and the rectory. No exterior work has been done since 2016. We simply could not afford it. At some point in the very near future we will have to start a major capital campaign across the archdiocese to assist us with meeting these expenses. However, we, as the cathedral parish, are expected to pull our weight as well and at this point we are not providing our share. On a regular weekly basis we are not able to meet our expenses. Suzanne regularly needs to decide which bills she will pay so that our bank balance stays in the black. Thus businesses, to which we owe money, don't get paid in the timely manner they should.

I am deeply grateful to those who give so generously; and many of you do so. I would ask all parishioners to prayerfully consider increasing the amount you are giving. I know some give all you possibly can. Thank you. However, I know others would be able to give more. Since I have come to know you, I know of many who, for whatever reason, don't give at all. Everyone needs to contribute if the cathedral is to continue to be the thriving parish it has been to date.

May God continue to bless us here at the cathedral parish.

THIS SHOWS ME THAT WE AS CATHOLICS HAVE LOST THE SIGNIFICANCE OF WHY WE PRAY FOR THE DEAD AND WHY WE OFFER THE HOLY SACRIFICE OF THE MASS FOR THEM. THE **OFFERING FOR** A **MASS** IN THE ARCHDIOCESE OF KINGSTON IS \$20.

The offering of Mass for the repose of the soul of the faithful departed is linked with our belief in Purgatory. We believe that if a person has died fundamentally believing in God, and having repented of all mortal/grievous sins, but with venial sins and the hurt caused by sin, then God in His divine love and mercy will first purify the soul. After this purification has been completed, the soul will have the holiness and purity needed to share in the beatific vision in heaven. While each individual stands judgment before the Lord and must render an account of his life, the communion of the Church shared on this earth continues, except for those souls dammed to hell.

The Second Vatican Council affirmed, "This sacred council accepts loyally the venerable faith of our ancestors in the living communion which exists between us and our brothers and sisters who are in the glory of heaven or who are yet being purified after their death..." (Dogmatic Constitution on the Church, No. 51). Therefore, just as we pray for each other and share each other's burdens now, the faithful on earth can offer prayers and sacrifices to help the departed souls undergoing purification, and no better prayer could be offered than that of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass.

Pope Leo XIII in his encyclical *Mirae Caritatis* (1902) beautifully elaborated this point and emphasized the connection between the communion of saints with the Mass: "The grace of mutual love among 'The living, strengthened and increased by the Sacrament of the Eucharist, flows' especially by virtue of the Sacrifice [of the Mass]' to all who belong to the communion of saints. For the communion of saints is simply... the mutual sharing of help, atonement, prayers, and benefits among the faithful, those already in the heavenly homeland, those consigned to the purifying fire, and those still making their pilgrim way here on earth. These all form one city, whose head is Christ, and whose vital principle is love. Faith teaches that although the august Sacrifice can be offered to God alone, it can nevertheless be celebrated in honour of the saints now reigning in heaven with God, who has crowned them, to obtain their intercession for us, and also, according to apostolic tradition, to wash away the stains of those brothers and sisters who have died in the Lord but without yet being wholly purified." .... those in Purgatory.

Think of this point: The Holy Mass transcends time and space, uniting the faithful in heaven, on earth and in purgatory into a Holy Communion, and the Holy Eucharist Itself augments our union with Christ, wipes away venial sins, and preserves us from future mortal sins (cf. *Catechism*, No. 1391-1396). Therefore, the offering of Mass and other prayers or sacrifices for the intentions of the faithful departed are good and holy acts. This practice is not new. The Catechism asserts, "From the beginning the Church has honoured the memory of the dead and offered prayers in suffrage for them, above all the Eucharistic Sacrifice, so that, thus purified, they may attain the beatific vision of God" (No. 1032). You just need to look around at the stained glass of our beautiful cathedral and see that these windows were installed in suffrage for the soul of some member of the donor's family.

Actually, this "beginning" has roots even in the Old Testament. Judas Maccabees offered prayers and sacrifices for the Jewish soldiers who had died wearing pagan amulets, which were forbidden by the Law; II Maccabees reads, "Turning to supplication, they prayed that the sinful deed might be fully blotted out" (Maccabees 12:43) and "Thus, [Judas Maccabees] made atonement for the deed mat they might be freed from sin" (Maccabees 12:46). In the early history of the Church, we also see evidence of prayers for the dead. Inscriptions uncovered on tombs in the Roman catacombs of the second century evidence this practice. For example, the epitaph on the tomb of Abercius (d. 180 AD) Bishop of Hieropolis in Phrygia begs for prayers for the repose of his soul' Tertullian in 211 AD attested to observing the anniversary of death with prayers. Moreover, the Canons of Hippolytus (c. 235 AD) explicitly mention the offering of prayers for the dead during the Mass.

The testimony of the Church Fathers beautifully supports this belief: St. Cyril of Jerusalem (d. 386 AD), in one of his many catechetical discourses, explained how at Mass both the living and dead are remembered, and how the Eucharistic Sacrifice of our Lord is of benefit to sinners, living and dead. St. Ambrose (d. 397) preached, "We have loved them during life; let us not abandon them in death, until we have conducted them by our prayers into the house of the Lord." St. John Chrysostom (d. 407 AD) stated, "Let us help end commemorate them. If Job's sons were purified by their father's sacrifice, why would we doubt that our offerings for the dead bring them some consolation? Let us not hesitate to help those who have died and to offer our prayers for them." Finally, Pope St. Gregory (d. 604 AD) said, "Let us not hesitate to help those who have died and to offer our prayers for them."

One may wonder, "What if the person's soul has already been purified and gone to heaven?" We on earth know neither the judgment of God nor the divine time frame; so, there is always goodness in remembering our departed and commending them to God through prayer and sacrifice. However, if indeed the departed soul has been purified and now rests in God's presence in heaven/ then those prayers and sacrifices offered benefit the other souls in purgatory through the love and mercy of God.

Therefore, we find not only the origins of this practice dating to the early Church but we also clearly recognize its importance. When we face the death of someone, even a person who is not Catholic, to have a Mass offered for the repose of his soul and to offer our prayers are more beneficial and comforting than any other sympathy card or bouquet of flowers or donation to some charity. Most importantly, we should always remember our own dearly departed loved ones in the Holy Mass and through our own prayers and sacrifices to help in their gaining eternal rest. I pray for my own dear mother and father, and my nephew, Adam, at every single Mass. Each year I celebrate the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass for them on the anniversary of their deaths and their birthdays, and wedding anniversary. As scripture says: "It is a good and holy thing to pray for the dead." (2 Maccabees 12:45)

We can also have Masses offered for persons who are living who need prayers for a particular reason such as those undergoing surgery, those meeting a particular milestone in their life, those suffering with serious illness etc.
