

Why do we end the liturgical year with the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe?

On the last Sunday of the liturgical year, we celebrate the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. Following this solemnity, we observe one more week of Ordinary Time, and then begin a new liturgical year with the First Sunday of Advent. The Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, which is also sometimes referred to as the Feast of Christ the King, was established by Pope Pius XI in 1925. Though it was originally celebrated in October, this feast was moved to the last

It is more than a coincidence that we close out the year with this particular feast. On this day especially, we celebrate the supreme kingship of Jesus over the entire universe. His is a kingship not like the secular monarchies of the past and present, but one that is pastoral, absolute, and desirous of bring us to himself. We await the coming of Christ in his eternal Kingdom, but we recognize that he is already King.

When we remember and reflect on Jesus Christ as King, we are better prepared to enter Advent. Though Advent is the beginning of a new liturgical year, the Church recognizes the cyclical nature of the calendar and ties its beginning with its end. During Advent, we wait in anticipation of the birth of Jesus, the Messiah. Today, after the world has witnessed the birth, death, and resurrection of Jesus, we await his coming again, and we know that it is Christ the King who will come. Ending the liturgical year with the Feast of Christ the King helps us to look both backward and forward: backward, so that we might better celebrate the joyful incarnation and birth of Jesus; and forward, so that we might be vigilant servants waiting for the day Jesus comes again.

No matter what time of the year it is, however, it is good to reflect on Jesus as King. Remembering this helps us to submit to him, not out of fear or habit, but out of love for our Creator and Savior.

I highly encourage the men of the parish to consider this Cursillo experience. Many who have been involved here over the past couple of years have found it to be truly life changing and have commented that it has drawn them much more deeply into the practice of their spiritual lives.

What exactly is Cursillo?

St. John Paul II said Cursillo is "an instrument raised up by God for the proclamation of the gospel of our time".

"Here is your role in the Church: to create clusters of believers who will carry the message of salvation everywhere, showing the seriousness of your opinion not by imposing it, but by a strong testimony". (Pope John Paul II)

Cursillo is a movement within the Roman Catholic Church

Its name comes from the Spanish word "Cursillo" which means small course. Its original full name is "Cursillo de Cristiandad" (short course in Christianity). However, it is not a theoretical course nor a traditional retreat; it is best described as an experience. An experience that leads to discover and better live what is fundamental in Christianity


During the Cursillo's 3-days, participants share a profound experience of Christian life ...

The week-end starts on a Thursday night and ends on Sunday night. During these three days, we learn:

- to get to know us (encounter of self),
- to experience the presence and love of Jesus Christ (encounter with God),
- to see the good that can provide a loving and caring Christian community (encounter with others).

... To help to influence their environment by the force of their testimony

The Cursillo Movement (CM) is an apostolic movement. Its goal is to share with the community the essence of Christianity and Christian values and in this way gradually transform the community from within. To convey its objective, the CM uses the expression "leavening society with the gospel" and it is counting primarily on the testimony of friendship and the deepening of the personal conversion of its members. KEEPING ALL OF YOU IN THE LOOP: **Update on our Properties**

Our Wonderful Cathedral and St. James' Chapel: You may have seen some architects crawling around the exterior and interior of the cathedral this past week. They have been seconded to formulate a proposal of the amount of work that needs to be done on the exterior of the cathedral. Once their proposal is in place a fundraising This will be campaign will be begun. diocesan wide, but, of course, we, the parish of St. Mary's, will be significant players, as this is our week-to-week home place of worship.

The Roof of the Cathedral: As you are

aware a good deal of damage happened to the roof of the cathedral during the storm of October 31. Upon closer examination the need for tile replacement is even far more extensive than originally thought. A good number of tiles that are still up there have come loose and need to be replaced. About a 20 foot width from the crest of the roof along the whole 200 ft. length needs to be replaced. You may have noticed the boom lift on the Clergy Street side on Monday, Nov. 18. This won't reach the top of the cathedral. A crane was brought in. It could not be adequately placed to do the job either. Thus, the old fashioned use of ladders is required. You will see a safety fence in place and the Clergy Street entrance to the cathedral will have to be closed off for the duration of the work. With the tiles off, the felt is exposed and needs to be repaired before any significant rain comes down and gets inside. This, as I mentioned earlier, is an insurance repair, however, our deductible is \$5,000. Many, many thanks to the very proactive parishioner who placed a \$1,000 cheque in last week's collection basket designating that it is to be used for the deductible. You can't imagine how edifying such unsolicited actions are to me and how much they lighten my load of concern.

The Rectory and the "Cottage" at 270 Brock Street: The future use of both of these properties is being examined.

The Interior of the Cathedral: As you know several bequests, amounting to about \$800,000 have been given and designated for the interior painting of the cathedral. Once the limestone exterior of the cathedral is secured and the masonry entirely repaired, we will proceed to this phase of Restoration; the interior of the cathedral. It would be foolish to paint the interior of the cathedral before the exterior has been completely sealed: before leakage and exterior repair have been done. There are several aspects to the interior renovation: the painting of the interior, the replacement of the carpet in the Sanctuary, the floor of the main body of the cathedral is also obviously in need of repair and our historic organ needs a good deal of work.

The Sanctuary Floor: Many have asked when the Sanctuary floor will be replaced. We have raised a considerable portion of the cost of the floor and the Knights of Columbus have given \$150,000 specifically for the floor as well. Even though we have had much fundraising for the floor of the Sanctuary, it must be the last, finishing touch of the restoration of the interior of the cathedral. It would be foolish to put in a marble floor and then have to put scaffolding on it to paint the walls and ceiling of the cathedral.

Our Historic Organ is also in need of major repairs. It may sound fine to most of us, however, there are a good number of pipes, stops and other parts which do not function properly or do not function at all; to the extent that when a guest organist arrived from McGill a couple of years ago for the Royal Canadian College of Organists' concert here at St. Mary's he initially refused to play on the organ because he deemed in to be in such poor working order. This is a very complex musical instrument. Did you know there are 2700 pipes up there? A committee of parishioners, chaired by our music director, Jeff Moellman, has been meeting bi-weekly for three months now to make a proposal regarding the needs of the organ which was installed in 1905 A.D. The committee has consulted widely and is exploring numerous possible plans of action. The most conservative estimates of the cost of work on the organ have come in between \$500,000 to \$750,000.

The Road Forward

We are not a wealthy parish. The cathedral is not just our responsibility but that of the whole archdiocese. We will be expected to pull our fair share, but, the Archdiocese will also make their contribution as well. This wonderful historical building is the Archdiocese's and our responsibility to maintain and preserve and even improve upon. This will all take a great deal of time as the funds are raised. We will do each phase as we have the funds to move forward. Each of these projects will unfold in due time. As you know the first five Bishops are buried in the crypt under the main altar of the cathedral as are many of the first Religious Sisters to come to the Archdiocese and many members of the laity. We stand on holy ground. As the granite sign on the west side of the steps entering the cathedral off Johnson Street declares: Ad Majoram Gloriam Dei; for the Greater Glory of God. Everything that has been done in the cathedral, most importantly the celebration of the Sacraments but also the very structure itself; and everything we do now and everything we will do in the future should fall under this rubric, ad majoram gloriam Dei. (For the Greater Glory of God)

A COMPLETELY SEPARATE CONSIDERATION: Our Parish Centre Property:

Over the past three years a committee has been meeting to determine the best possible use of the property that is St. Mary's Parish Centre 260 Brock Street. As you know we have lost on average \$40,000 per year on that building. There are several areas which need major attention for repairs but we have held off on them during the discernment process of what to do with the building. The committee which has been meeting is a combination of three members of a very generous donor group and our Parish Finance and Property Committee. It is the proposal of this committee that together with the financial backing of this sponsor that the property be transferred to an independent Not for Profit Corporation which would build an apartment building of 6 to 8 stories on the footprint of the property; that is the old St. Mary's School plus the parking lot. We don't foresee going much higher as we don't want to shadow the magnificent stain glass windows of the cathedral. There would be one bedroom apartments, two bedroom apartments and bachelor apartments. Part of the proposal would be that the first floor be retained and used as our Parish Centre with a large meeting area and a couple of smaller meeting areas together with a good commercial sized Kitchen, not dissimilar to the one we have in the present parish centre. The plan would also have two or three stories of parking below ground some of which would be accessible for parish use. The City of Kingston has been consulted and they are enthusiastic about the project. CMHC (Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation), demographic consultants and architects are being consulted as well. We are at a point where the financing looks feasible and banks have been consulted regarding financing. This would be a corporation that is independent of the cathedral but would be run by a board of directors, consisting of the major stake holders, three from the sponsor and three from the cathedral, who would direct the eventual cash flow to assist St. Mary's Cathedral. All in all the project would be in the area of \$25 plus million dollars and the hope is to have shovels in the ground by 2021.

General Parish Meeting, Thursday, January 9th, 2020 at 7 pm

There will be a general parish meeting to give you more detailed information on each of the categories mentioned above and to answer questions and address concerns as best we can to date. At this point the archdiocese is aware of all this, and supportive, but a formal proposal has not been submitted as of yet for final approval.

If you would like to meet with me and discuss this in more depth after the meeting in January, I would be more than happy to do so as would Mark Levac the chairman of the Finance and Property Committee.
